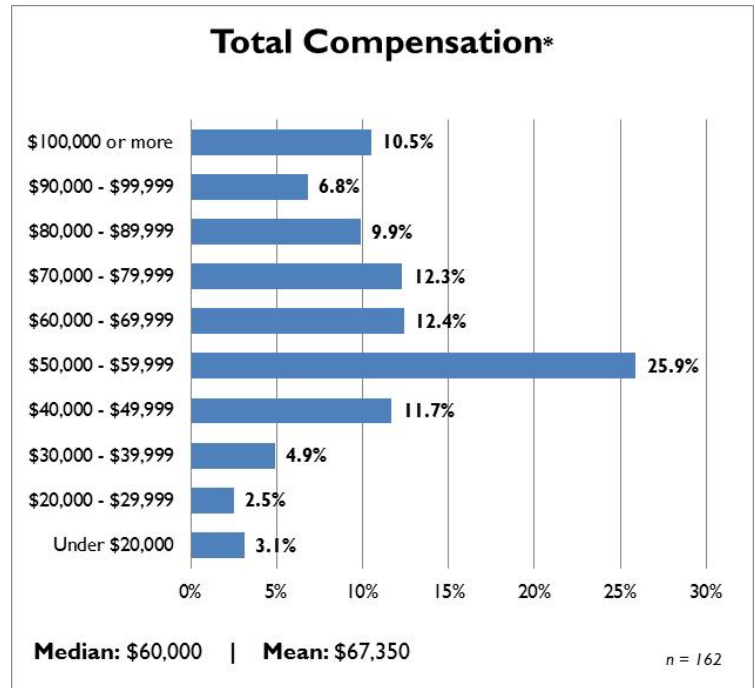
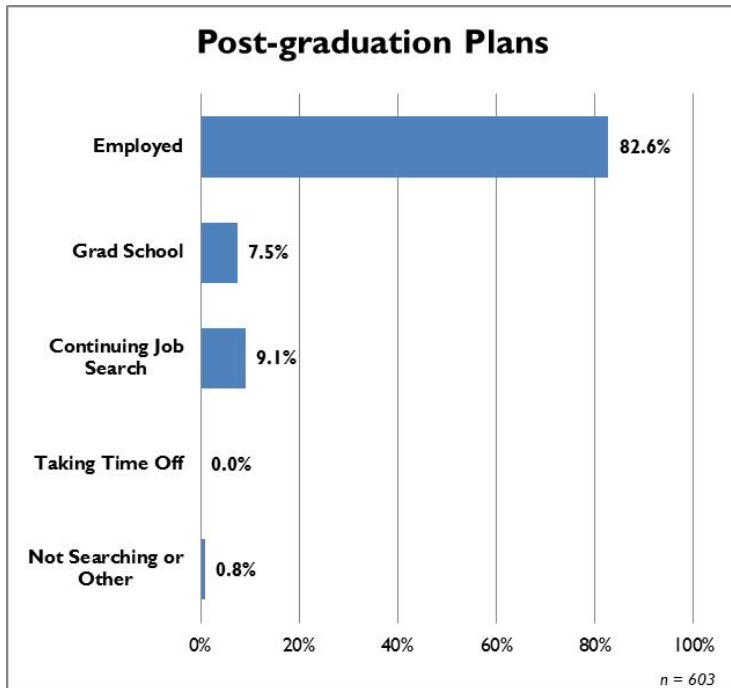


2017 Graduating Student Survey Results: Graduate School of Arts and Sciences (GSAS)

All numbers below represent the percentage of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences students who applied for graduation in October 2016, February 2017, or May 2017 and whose post-graduation outcome was collected in the 2017 Graduating Student Survey. The outcomes of **55.3%** of all GSAS students have been collected for this report as of November 30th, 2017.

Noteworthy Trends:

- 90.1% of graduates are employed or continuing their education.
- 77.8% of reported total compensation ranges are above \$50,000, with 39.5% above \$70,000.
- 80.6% of respondents had one or more internships during their time as a Columbia University student.
- The Financial Services, Education: Higher Education, and Research industries are the most popular for graduates who have accepted post-graduation employment.
- Columbia University is the most popular destination for continued graduate studies.
